TERRY'S THOUGHTS



As promised, at our recent Executive Board meeting, I am beginning a series of articles designed to demonstrate how valuable the association can be for your churches and ministries. A good friend and colleague suggested the following reasons why the association adds value to the churches (I will be sharing the opinions of many whom I trust and have mentored me through the years). The following are those suggestions:

1. The association adds value through EFFECTIVENESS. Meaning we are better together. A lady planning a piano and singing, or a guy strumming on a guitar doing a solo, can surely be a

blessing. Yet, it takes it up a notch when there is the harmony of multiple voices and a symphony of many instruments. Each enhances the other, and so do we in church life.

2. The association adds value through ENCOURAGEMENT. The burdens of the repetitive nature of day-to-day ministry can be depleting. The crises that often arise may be depressing. Discouragement sets in when we feel like we are alone in our work. But we can encourage and be encouraged as we serve alongside each other.

3. The association adds value through EFFICIENCY. We all have blind spots. It is easy to become distracted by activity and fail to do what brings accomplishment. Our ax gets dull. But, "As iron sharpens iron, so a man sharpens the countenance of his friend," (Prov. 27:17). The tyranny of the urgent can eclipse the assignment of God. Having others as a sounding board can help us be more efficient. They can be a lens to bring clarity to our task.

4. The association adds value through EXAMPLE. God is love and His people are to be marked by love. Jesus said that is how you recognize His disciples. In our unity as churches (not uniformity as we may differ in secondary matters) but bound together in truth and love – conviction and compassion – we set an example of Christ to our lost community.

It is my prayer that we all would remember, based on the above illustrations, how impactful our involvement within the association can add value! When there are opportunities to gather with your fellow brothers and sisters either at a regularly scheduled meeting, a ministry event, some sort of training event, or simply a fellowship designed to build our koinonia (Greek for Fellowship) you will be able to see the value of such gatherings, due to their Effectiveness, Encouragement, Efficiency, and Example. July has been a very full month of ministry throughout the three Baptists on Mission partnerships we coordinate. We are praising God for volunteers who are willing to help other churches and ministries reach their communities for Christ. There have been some wonderful, miraculous stories of changes in lives and communities. We have visited several pastors to discuss future partnership opportunities as well as numerous mission teams working here in PA this month. What a blessing this has been!

For ten days this month, we worked in Vermont. Several months ago, we began planning appreciation dinners for pastors and wives in Vermont. We did not know that the week we would be carrying these out, Vermont would be experiencing horrific flooding that would destroy homes, businesses and lives of these dear people. God allowed us to assist the leadership of Disaster Relief with visiting some pastors whose homes and churches were flooded. Dewey also assisted Washington Baptist Church with flood cleanup of the grounds as well as cleaning the DR shower trailer that had been imbedded in mud. For three nights in different locations, we traveled to set up, clean and serve. Gifts were given and our NC/VT partnership info was shared and celebrated with Mark Abernathy leading us. Joys and challenges were shared by the pastors and wives followed by small group prayer time. We met new friends and reacquainted with long- time friends as we discussed future partnership opportunities. Twenty eight pastor couples attended the dinners and all were encouraged and renewed. These events were held in memory of our friend and co-laborer Jim Wrenn who went home to heaven this year. We praise God for the blessing of partnership!

In a few days, we will return for ten days to NC. We will celebrate some special days with family as well as speak in a church. When we return, we will go to New Hampshire to lead a team of prayerwalkers and encouragers with pastors there. We will visit more pastors in central Massachusetts as well. One of the goals in leading teams like this is to encourage more NC churches to be on mission in these areas. It is time for us to begin gathering volunteer requests for 2024. Pray with us that there will be even more churches willing to come and serve in the months ahead.

Region 7 - South Asia

The Church & The Gospel

South Asia is a very diverse region, with many languages, religious beliefs, food habits, political systems, and cultural practices. While a small minority of evangelical Christians actively propagate the gospel, the majority of people in this region practice Hinduism, Buddhism, or Islam. South Asia contains about 45% of Asia's population and more than 25% of the world's population. This region includes Bangladesh, Bhutan, India, Maldives, Nepal, Pakistan, Indonesia, Malaysia, Brunei, and Sri Lanka. Bangladesh, Pakistan, and the Maldives are Islamic states, generally hostile to the gospel. The church faces increasing restrictions in India, Nepal, and Bhutan.



Unreached People Groups

This is an incredibly open harvest field. Of the more than 3,800 people groups in this region, some 3,400 remain unreached, with dozens of them each numbering in the millions. India alone has a population of 1.3 billion people, with 2,300 unreached people groups. Ninety-five percent of the world's least evangelized people live in this area of the world.

Group Focus: The Shaikh



The Shaikh people of Bangladesh (137 million) constitute the largest unreached people group in the world. They are almost 100% Muslim, mainly Sunni, and look upon the very few Christians among them as outsiders and a threat to their way of life. They speak Bengali, which provides opportunities for them to hear the gospel since the Bible, the Jesus Film, and Christian radio broadcasts are all available in Bengali. Though the potential harvest is abundant, very few laborers have stepped forward. Bangladesh's extreme poverty further hinders efforts to reach the Shaikh people. The country has also been repeatedly devastated by typhoons and massive flooding. Pray that the Lord will raise up men and women willing to face harsh conditions to share the love of Christ with a people bound in complete spiritual darkness.

Prayer Points for Central Asia

- Pray about the pervasive influence of Hinduism in Nepal, and Buddhism in Bhutan and Sri Lanka. Also, Islam continues to make great progress in this region.
- Pray for workers, funding, and resources to help the church grow in South Asia.
- Pray for the growing anti-Christian policies of the Indian and Nepalese governments. There is much opposition to the gospel, and open attacks on worship centers, churches, and individual families are becoming more frequent.
- Pray for the countries of the Maldives and Bhutan. These two countries have extreme religious practices (Islam and Buddhism respectively) and are absolutely closed to the gospel. Pray for open doors and opportunities for the people of these countries to hear the gospel.
- Pray for persecuted believers in this region: for their protection, freedom to profess their Christian faith, and liberty to worship.

God's Purpose to Conquer Lostness

The big outreach event was almost here. Plans had been made and prayer supporters engaged. South Asian believer Abel was leading the efforts for a widespread gospel outreach to a largely unreached district. But COVID-19 disrupted the plans. Transportation to the region shut down and the event had to be cancelled.

But Abel didn't feel like God was cancelling the efforts. He sensed the Lord saying he should focus on a community closer to home. The prayers kept coming and Abel and his wife, Sarah, went out boldly to share the gospel. That's when God led them to a community of M-Jo people with no known believers. Living in family clusters, the M-Jo had not heard the gospel, but two families showed an interest in the visitors and hearing more of the stories they told.



God chose to move in this village, but His movement started years before with IMB missionary Paul Nations. Paul, who made a home with his wife and four children in South Asia, spent years discipling Nathan. Nathan is the one who led Abel and Sarah to the Lord. They all serve together now with one purpose - to penetrate the darkness of this region with the light of Christ.

Abel and Sarah returned week after week to the M-Jo community, faithfully sharing the gospel. Several chose to believe and after the seventh week, a man named Stephen chose to follow in believer's baptism - the first known baptized believer in this people group. Stephen was the answer to many prayers, and not just the prayers of teh



missionary team. He was the answer to the prayers of those who faithfully ask God to move among the world's unreached people.

Stephen was anxious to grow in his faith and his Christian friends faithfully discipled him. The more he learned, the more he taught others. The first person Stephen baptized was his own mother. Her eternity changed forever because of her son's obedience to the Lord and the boldness of Christians to bring the message to his village.

Stephen leads efforts to reach his own people group with the gospel. There are now 11 known believers in this community, and 27 fami-

lies regularly meet to hear the Word of God taught.

With a strong team of national believers, Paul invests his time discipling, training, and building in them the vision to reach the millions of unreached in their country with the gospel. Paul emphasizes the lost living around them. They are intentional to pray for them and ask others to do the same. In this country, the value of disciples who make disciples is on full display and changed lives is the result.

Will you join Paul and his family in praying for the unreached people of South Asia? Thank God for believers and disciple-makers Nathan, Abel, Sarah, and Stephen. Praise God for other believers among the M-Jo people, and ask Him to extend His reach into this people group.

SCOTUS "Groff Opinion" Another Win for Religious Liberty

In the last week of June, the United States Supreme Court issued a number of key opinions as its "2022 term" came to a close. Much attention was given to the divided ruling in 303 Creative v. Elenis, which found that Christian website designer Lorie Smith could not be forced by the State of Colorado to create websites and "speech" that violated her First Amendment rights. Another important win, the case of Groff v. DeJoy, received less attention, but also marked a major victory for religious liberty.

In this case, the Supreme Court unanimously ruled in favor of Gerald Groff, an Evangelical Christian who resigned from his job with the United States Postal Service (USPS) because he sought to honor the Sabbath by not working on Sundays. When he began work with the USPS in 2012, Groff was able to arrange his schedule to have Sundays off, but several years later the USPS began delivering packages for Amazon, which required Sunday deliveries. Although some accommodations were made, Groff continued to receive "progressive discipline" for failing to work Sundays and ultimately resigned his job in 2019.

The opinion began by stating: "Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 requires employers to accommodate the religious practice of their employees unless doing so would impose an 'undue hardship on the conduct of the employer's business." The question before the Court essentially revolved around what the USPS had to prove in order to legally deny Groff a religious accommodation.

Important Ruling

The Justices were undivided in their view about what employers must show to deny religious accommodations. Clarifying a rule from a previous case, the Court explained exactly what is meant by "undue hardship," and said that employers have to show "more than a de minimis cost" in order to deny an employee a religious accommodation.

Title VII Clarified

Looking at Title VII, the Court focused on the language of "undue hardship," which it defined as accommodations that "would result in substantial increased costs in relation to the conduct of its particular business." Importantly, the Court ruled out certain situations that cannot be used to suggest undue hardship and deny a religious accommodation, such as a "coworker's dislike of religious practice and expression in the workplace."

2023 Appalachian Christmas Outreach

Appalachian Coalfields Ministry, sponsored by NC Baptists on Mission, seeks to meet the physical and spiritual needs of people living in the Appalachian Area. One of the greatest ministry needs in this area occurs at Christmastime. We are calling on churches statewide to respond to this need through Appalachian Christmas Outreach in 2023.

GOAL and COLLECTION DATE:

The statewide goal is to collect 21,000 backpacks of items to be distributed to Appalachian children in areas of need in late November and December of 2023. The state-wide collection day for 2023 is Saturday, November 4 from 9am to noon. Thirty plus collection sites will be set up across the state for churches to bring their backpacks to. Specific sites will be listed on the Baptists On Mission website in September. We encourage churches to begin collecting and filling the packs early – and throughout the year.

AGE GROUPING and LABELING.

Each backpack should be labeled boy or girl as well as the appropriate age. Age groupings are 4-7, 8-10; 11-14; and 15-17 <u>Due to labels falling off in previous vears, we have done to a ribbon system for labeling the backpacks</u>. A royal blue (or similar) ribbon will indicate a boy's backpack. A pink ribbon will indicate a girl's backpack. In addition, a yellow ribbon will indicate that the backpack is for ages 4-7, a green ribbon for ages 8-10, a red ribbon for ages 11-14; and a white ribbon for ages 15-17.

Please prepare each backpack as you would for your own child or grandchild, with new items, not used. Please include items from each category listed to the right. <u>Please do not neglect to put in a Bible!</u> This may be the only Christmas present this child receives, and will be a witness of Christ's love.

ITEMS TO COLLECT

Each zippered backpack should include:

1) ITEMS OF NEW WARM CLOTHING including a winter cap, gloves, 2-3 socks, and scarf

2) METAL POP-TOP CANS OF FOOD (3-4 cans) such as ravioli, tuna, beef stew, vegetables, fruit

3) At least one or two NEW, AGE-APPROPRIATE TOYS Examples: small cars, balls, dolls, small stuffed animals, puzzles, jump rope, sidewalk chalk, Slinky, card games, Legos, other (*no toy weapons, please!*) For older youth category, substitute appropriate item for toy. No pocketknives! (See website for suggestions).

4) HYGIENE ITEMS including toothbrush, soap, washcloth, brush /comb, full-sized shampoo toothpaste, deodorant (please fit these items into a one-gallon Ziploc bag so they will not leak).

5) FRESH, WRAPPED CANDY (no chocolate please, as it may melt – and no peanut products please due to allergies)

6) A CHILDREN'S or YOUTH BIBLE (no particular version is required) <u>This is the most</u> <u>important thing that goes into</u> the pack! Please include!

7) A COPY OF THE CHRISTMAS STORY (downloadable and printable pdf found on website)
