TERRY'S THOUGHTS



Allow me to divert from my ongoing series of articles dealing with the value of the association to celebrate and recognize the importance of observing Pastor Appreciation Month. Calling your attention to this important annual event is, in fact, another aspect of the association that illustrates its value. What is Pastor Appreciation Month and how can we appropriately celebrate this annual activity in our churches? The following are a few of my thoughts and suggestions on what Pastor Appreciation is and how you can honor your pastor while celebrating all the hard work he has done on your behalf:

- This event was made formal several years ago and it provides an opportunity to tangibly show your pastor how much you appreciate his efforts to serve you, your family and the community you call home.
- Consider his faithfulness to proclaim the truths of God's word on a weekly basis. Vance Havener once said in defense of preaching and preachers, "The Bible doesn't say how will they hear without a brass band, but rather how will they hear unless they have a preacher!" Vance was referencing Romans 10:14 where the Apostle Paul is asking a series of questions to Israel's rejection of the message of Christ, "How, then, can they call on him they have not believed in? And how can they believe without hearing about him? And how can they hear without a preacher?" It is hard work being prepared each week to preach, at least two or three times so that you and your families are "equipped" to understand what it means to be a Christian and to know what the Lord expects of us as believers.
- **Consider his love for you.** I have yet to meet a preacher who was genuinely called to ministry and to a particular church that doesn't love his congregation, warts and all! Speaking from experience, when a pastor loves his congregation there is nothing he can't withstand or that he will do for those he is charged to serve.
- **Consider the sacrifices he makes in terms of time and family in order to better serve you!** We laugh, every now and then, when a joke is made that a preacher only works perhaps twice a week. The sad thing is that some people actually believe that. Please allow me to dispel that rumor here and now. Again, pastors who are worth their salt faithfully visit and pray over the needy, the sick, those who have spiritual and physical issues only the Lord and perhaps the pastor can solve, along with a host of other matters too numerous to list. Further many of those matters help the church to function properly and most never know it is him, the pastor, that provides services we all enjoy as well as take advantage of.
- **How can we honor our pastors tangibly?** How about writing hand written cards expressing your sincere appreciation for all he does (don't forget their spouses who serve alongside him) and include a gift card. The church could designate a Sunday, in October, to recognize him, along with his family, publicly with a love offering and special testimonies of their faithfulness as well as your love for them. What about giving he and his family a weekend off to spend time with each other away from the ministry area. The convention has three conferences centers within our state that have mostly free accommodations in prime spots for them to enjoy some time together as a family.
- Finally, as one church did for their pastor, they made it a point to have the entire congregation send he and his family cards (with something in them), provided meals, and took them out for meals assuming the cost each day of October. That pastor was blown away and their relationship with the church has grown mightily. God always blesses his people when they honor the Lord regularly as well as His servants.

I could go on; however, space and time will not allow. I assure you that a healthy and beloved servant is a powerful resource for the body of Christ. For more tips and ideas on how you might honor your pastor check out our newsletter, Lifeway.com, and NCBaptist.org. Won't you join me in honoring all of our pastors here in the TBA? I am sure we will see a surge in relationships and ministry when His people honor His servants.

Remember I love you as well and consider it my honor to serve you; the best folks I know in the Kingdom of God! Also remember we, at the association, stand ready to serve you in whatever way necessary to see you succeed in your ministries.

NC Baptists on Mission Volunteer Couple of the Year Dewey & Kathie Aiken

Our Volunteer Couple of the Year met when they were in high school. Faith, family, and missions have been a hallmark of their lives and partnership together since the beginning. Service in their local church and participation in short-term mission trips became a part of who they are.

Things changed for this couple while enjoying a 25th anniversary trip through the New England region. Their eyes and hearts were opened to the tremendous spiritual need in the region. A seed was planted, and they began to earnestly pray about what God wanted them to do about it. While attending a Mission Conference in 2002, God's plan became clear. The Lord wanted them to conclude their successful careers as a purchasing manager for Duke Energy, and a registered nurse, and move to Vermont.



In 2005, Baptists on Mission began a partnership with the state of Vermont, and it was simply natural that this couple becomes the on-site coordinators for the partnership. That began what has been an incredible blessing for North Carolina Baptists!

From 2005-2009 they served in Vermont and helped North Carolina Baptists develop a deep love for the people and the congregations there. In 2009 they felt the call to move back to Brevard, North Carolina, but to serve in the Appalachian Mountains among some of the poorest communities in our nation. Baptists on Mission started the Appalachian Coalfields Ministry, and this couple became our on-site coordinators.

Their work today includes providing on-site coordination in the Appalachian Region (since 2009), the state of Pennsylvania (since 2017), and New England again - all three areas where Baptists on Mission enjoy National Partnerships. They encourage and pray for hundreds of pastors, church planters, and their families. They assist scores of mission teams as they serve in our Partnership areas.

This couple is widely known - and loved - for their positive attitude, their smiling disposition, their can-do spirit, and their loving hearts.

2023 Appalachian Christmas Outreach

Appalachian Coalfields Ministry, sponsored by NC Baptists on Mission, seeks to meet the physical and spiritual needs of people living in the Appalachian Area. One of the greatest ministry needs in this area occurs at Christmastime. We are calling on churches statewide to respond to this need through Appalachian Christmas Outreach in 2023.

GOAL and COLLECTION DATE:

The statewide goal is to collect 21,000 backpacks of items to be distributed to Appalachian children in areas of need in late November and December of 2023. The state-wide collection day for 2023 is Saturday, November 4 from 9am to noon. Thirty plus collection sites will be set up across the state for churches to bring their backpacks to. Specific sites will be listed on the Baptists On Mission website in September. We encourage churches to begin collecting and filling the packs early – and throughout the year.

AGE GROUPING and LABELING.

Each backpack should be labeled boy or girl as well as the appropriate age. Age groupings are 4-7, 8-10; 11-14; and 15-17 <u>Due to labels falling off in previous years, we have gone to a ribbon system for labeling the backpacks</u>. A royal blue (or similar) ribbon will indicate a boy's backpack. A pink ribbon will indicate a girl's backpack. In addition, a yellow ribbon will indicate that the backpack is for ages 4-7, a green ribbon for ages 8-10, a red ribbon for ages 11-14; and a white ribbon for ages 15-17.

Please prepare each backpack as you would for your own child or grandchild, with new items, not used. Please include items from each category listed to the right. <u>Please do not neglect to put in a Bible!</u> This may be the only Christmas present this child receives, and will be a witness of Christ's love.

ITEMS TO COLLECT

Each zippered backpack should include:

1) ITEMS OF NEW WARM CLOTHING including a winter cap, gloves, 2-3 socks, and scarf

2) METAL POP-TOP CANS OF FOOD (3-4 cans) such as ravioli, tuna, beef stew, vegetables, fruit

3) At least one or two NEW, AGE-APPROPRIATE TOYS Examples: small cars, balls, dolls, small stuffed animals, puzzles, jump rope, sidewalk chalk, Slinky, card games, Legos, other (no toy weapons, please!) For older youth category, substitute appropriate item for toy. No pocketknives! (See website for suggestions).

4) HYGIENE ITEMS including toothbrush, soap, washcloth, brush /comb, full-sized shampoo toothpaste, deodorant (please fit these items into a one-gallon Ziploc bag so they will not leak).

5) FRESH, WRAPPED CANDY (no chocolate please, as it may melt – and no peanut products please due to allergies)

6) A CHILDREN'S or YOUTH BIBLE (no particular version is required) <u>This is the most</u> <u>important thing that goes into</u> the pack! Please include!

7) A COPY OF THE CHRISTMAS STORY (downloadable and printable pdf found on website)

Region 9 - East Asia

The Church & The Gospel

East Asia consists of China, Mongolia, Taiwan, Japan, and North and South Korea. Together they make up a total of 1.6 billion people. This is a region shrouded with mystery and ancient religions, including Buddhism, Shintoism, ancestor worship, Sunni Islam, and atheism - all of which are widespread here. Despite this, Christianity has made a significant impact in some countries, such as China, Taiwan, and South Korea. Still, there is a high degree of persecution against Christians, especially in China and North Korea.



Unreached People Groups

A total of 504 unreached people groups live in East Asia, comprising more than 300 million people. Among the largest groups are the Japanese, with 121 million unreached people. The highest concentration of unreached people is found in China, with 445 groups.



Group Focus: The Uygur People

The Uygur (pronounced wee-gur) are an unreached people group in China. The highest concentration of their more than 10 million people is found along the border between China and Kazakhstan, though Uygurs are found in almost all on China's provinces. The Uygurs are ethnically related to the Turkic peoples, including Uzbeks and Kazaks. They practice a form of Sunni folk Islam, mixed with superstitious traditions. Historically resistant to the gospel, until recently there were fewer than 50 Uygur believers. In the last few years, more than 400 Uygurs have come to Christ and have been baptized. Many of these now serve as evangelists among their people.

In 2015 the Chinese government cracked down on religion. This resulted in more than 1.5 million Uygurs being sent to "Redoctrination Camps" (prisons). In these camps, torture is often used in an attempt to force them to leave their Islamic faith. Since the Uygur also are an independent people, the government views them as unpatriotic and dangerous. Much prayer is needed for the millions of Uygurs who have no Christian witness.

Prayer Points for Central Asia

- Pray for a moving of God's Spirit among the people of East Asia to confront the spiritual darkness that has blinded their hearts for centuries.
- Pray for the translation and distribution of the Scriptures in their own languages and dialects. Many Christians in this region do not have a single Bible.
- In light of the ongoing persecution in China and North Korea, pray that God's people will remain faithful and that their example will serve as a powerful witness to their faith.
- Ask God to cast down the materialism that keeps the Japanese from listening to and seeing the reality of God and His plan of redemption.
- Pray for native missionaries to engage the remaining unreached groups in their regions to bring the gospel to the unreached and the unengaged.

6 Things to Look For When Evaluating Church Health

Where is your church strongest? Weakest? What steps will you take to capitalize on your strengths while also addressing your weaknesses?

Many writers (including me) have written books about characteristics of a healthy church. A brief article cannot describe all these characteristics in detail, but here are some of those traits. Perhaps this list will help you evaluate your church.

First, a healthy church is committed to the Word of God as its authority. They may still be learning to apply it well, but they know they must filter all they do through the Scriptures. It is the Word that directs them to Christ, who is the cornerstone and head of the church. It is the Word they proclaim Sunday after Sunday.

Second, a healthy church is not a perfect church, but they continually strive to follow Christ and make disciples. We too often assume a healthy church will have no problems, but that is not the case. A healthy church will be imperfect, and it might even be a bit messy at times — especially as they reach non-believers. Still, they seek to honor God in all they do.

Third, a healthy church works to do well all six purposes of the church: worship, evangelism, discipleship, ministry/ service, prayer and fellowship. They seldom do them all well at the same time, and never do they do them perfectly. Instead, they seek to grow and improve in each one, recognizing that a healthy church completes all six purposes. They evaluate themselves regularly, and they do not "settle" where they are.

Fourth, a healthy church has a clear outward focus. They work to reach non-believers and equip new believers. They provide evangelism training. Their members intentionally know non-believers. They share the gospel with them, baptize them and teach them to obey all Jesus commanded. They welcome new church plants in their area. Their budget reflects dollars spent on others rather than themselves. These commitments, of course, are included in the six purposes listed above, but they emphasize doing the work of the Great Commission.

Fifth, a healthy church is passionate about reaching the nations around them and around the world. That is, they take seriously the call to make disciples of all peoples. Their commitment to the nations is evident in their praying, giving, going and sending. They raise up leaders, equip them and send the "called-out ones" to North America and around the world. They do not keep their best; they commission them if God has called them to go.

Finally, a healthy church has prayer in its DNA. That commitment starts with the lead pastor, and it permeates all the church does. They live out this almost contradictory reality: they are a strong congregation, but their strength comes from their being weak. They march forward, but they march on their knees.

Using this list to assess your church, where is your church strongest? Weakest? What steps will you take to capitalize on your strengths while also addressing your weaknesses?
