Convention Highlights from Greensboro

More than 1,500 messengers from N.C. Baptist churches gathered on Nov. 6-7 for the 193rd Baptist State Convention of North Carolina's annual meeting.

In a historic meeting that saw a number of firsts, N.C. Baptists approved a budget that moved to a 50/50 Cooperative Program split, celebrated missionaries from the state and saw the first African American preside over the state convention's annual meeting during the two-day event held Nov. 6-7.

"Because you give, together we can go. Thank you for your generosity and partnership in the Gospel.

The local church is God's plan "A" for reaching a lost and dying world. It's amazing to see local churches freely working together for the shared mission of taking the Gospel to our neighborhoods and the nations. And we get to do that as a movement of churches who are on mission together. That's not just a slogan. That's who we are as NC Baptists.

I am thankful for the momentum God has graciously given us, and I believe our best days of ministry are ahead. God is on the move in North Carolina, and I look forward to continuing to be on mission together with you."

In a historic vote, messengers to the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina's annual meeting overwhelmingly approved a 2024 budget on Tuesday (Nov. 7) that calls for Cooperative Program receipts to be divided equally between the state and national conventions.

The theme of this year's event was "Shepherd the Flock" based on 1 Peter 5:1-4. In verse two of that passage, Peter exhorts elders "to shepherd the flock of God that is among you" (ESV).

Ronjour Locke, elder at Treasuring Christ Community Church in Raleigh and instructor of preaching and urban ministry at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, opened the conference by preaching on "The Shepherd and His Character" from Psalm 15. Locke said character begins with the gospel, and he shared three types of character that flows from the gospel – relational character, judicial character and sacrificial character.



Tony Merida, pastor of Imago Dei Church in Raleigh, preached on "The Shepherd and Adversity" from 2 Corinthians 12:1-10, which addresses the Apostle Paul's heavenly experience and his thorn in the flesh. Merida shared three reasons for suffering: suffering humbles us and points us to our need for God's power; suffering causes us to draw near to the Lord; and suffering enables us to learn that Jesus really is enough.

Jim Shaddix, professor of preaching at Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, preached on "The Shepherd and His Preaching" from Jeremiah 23:16-32. Shaddix shared a warning with attendees not to ignore the counsel of God as some prophets of ancient Israel did in the Old Testament. Shaddix encouraged pastors to prioritize personal and prayerful communion with the Lord in their ministry.

Mark Clifton, teaching pastor of Linwood Baptist Church in Linwood, Kansas, preached on "The Shepherd and Revitalization" from Matthew 11:2-6. Clifton shared four reasons that John the Baptist questioned that Jesus was the Savior and how Jesus resolved those doubts. Clifton encouraged pastors that as they are discouraged to look to Jesus for revitalization because only revitalized pastors can revitalize churches.

Jason K. Allen, president of Midwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Kansas City, Missouri, preached on "The Shepherd and His Study." Allen shared seven reasons for pastors to be faithful in their study along with some practical applications drawn from 2 Timothy 2:15.

David Brady, senior pastor at Christ Community Church in Mount Airy, preached on "The Shepherd and Steadfastness" from 1 Corinthians 15:58. Brady shared three things that should inform the shepherd's daily life. They are: the shepherd's daily foundation should be the gospel; the shepherd's daily work should be being "steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord;" and the shepherd's daily direction should be the return of Christ.

H.B. Charles Jr., senior pastor at Shiloh Metropolitan Baptist Church in Jacksonville, Florida, preached on "The Shepherd and Gospel Centrality" from 2 Timothy 4:1-5. Charles shared four commands for how pastors are to preach the word. Pastors should preach the word dutifully, defiantly and devotionally, Charles said.

Danny Akin, president of Southeastern Baptist Theological Seminary, preached on "The Shepherd and the Great Commission" from Matthew 28:16-20. Akin shared how Jesus' command in the Great Commission shows us God's complete power, his global plan and his constant presence. Akin also encouraged pastors to be passionate about the Great Commission which will make their churches passionate about the Great Commission.

- At the close of registration, 529 pastors, 363 church staff and 623 laity had registered for this year's annual meeting for a total of 1,515 messengers. An additional 365 visitors registered for a grand total of 1,880 in attendance.
- Messengers approved a 2024 Cooperative Program (CP) budget totaling \$31 million, a \$1.5 million or 5% increase over the current budget that also moves the state convention to a 50/50 split with global ministry partners.
- Messengers approved a motion stipulating that undesignated CP receipts in excess of the \$31 million budget in 2024 be allocated at 50% to global ministry partners and 50% to state convention ministries.



- Messengers adopted a \$2.6 million goal for the 2024 North Carolina Missions Offering, an increase of \$100,000 or 4% over the current goal of \$2.5 million. Under the offering goal for 2024, NCMO allocations would remain unchanged with 62% going to Baptists on Mission ministries, 28% to church planting in North Carolina and 10% to associational missions projects.
- All three current convention officers were reelected to second terms of service. Quintell Hill, lead pastor of Multiply Community Church in Monroe, was re-elected as president. Jason Mil-


ler, senior pastor of Dutch Cove Baptist Church in Canton, was re-elected as first vice president. Allen Murray, pastor of Centerville Baptist Church in Kelly, was re-elected as second vice president. All three officers ran unopposed.

- Messengers adopted an amended "Resolution on Equal Protection For The Preborn."
- During his executive director-treasurer's address, Todd Unzicker shared an address with messengers that high-lighted four ways N.C. Baptists are on mission together. They are: training, reaching, sending and serving.
- During his president's address, Quintell Hill preached on "What's so Good About the Good Samaritan?" from Luke 10:25-37.
- Messengers approved a report and recommendations from the *Biblical Recorder (BR)* Study Committee about the working arrangement between the state convention and the *BR*. Messengers also approved a series of amendments to the *BR*'s bylaws based upon recommendations made by the study committee.
- Messengers heard reports from N.C. Baptist institutions, agencies and other ministry partners, including the Biblical Recorder, Provision Financial Resources of N.C. Baptists (formerly the N.C. Baptist Foundation), the Baptist Children's Homes (BCH) of North Carolina, N.C. Baptists on Mission, and the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission of the Southern Baptist Convention.
- N.C. Baptist leaders recognized Clay Warf, longtime president of Provision Financial Resources, who is retiring at the end of the year after 25 years of service.
- Miles Mullin, vice president and chief of staff with the Ethics and Religious Liberty Commission, presented N.C. Baptists with the Psalm 139 Project's Partner for Life Award.

Calling Out the Called: 5 Things Your Church Can Do

Have you ever had a sinking feeling that there's a bigger problem lurking around the corner? Maybe you have noticed drops of oil on your garage floor or a water stain forming on your ceiling. These types of scenarios are examples of small symptoms that reveal much deeper problems beneath the surface. Whether they are the result of unintentional oversights or reveal some level of negligence on our part, left unaddressed you can be certain that the cost and collateral damage will be far greater than if you confront the issue head on.

The problem we're facing: In recent decades the focus in the church has shifted away from intentional efforts to invite believers to consider vocational ministry as a calling. As a result, there's a leadership famine in our local churches. There are a variety of factors that have contributed to this trend, but perhaps the greatest obstacle we face is simply an unintended one. Our desire to mobilize the church, emphasize spiritual community and authorize every member to live on mission, has essentially neutralized a call to vocational ministry.

It is important for us to affirm that, indeed, in the church there is no spiritual "varsity" team of leaders and "junior varsity" team of laity. God has called all believers to serve the local church and fulfill the Great Commission. In this sense, there is a "universal calling" for all believers to serve the Lord and actively participate in his mission. So-called "secular" vocations are intended by God to be missional platforms in our culture and communities. In fact, these vocational callings are an essential part of the gospel mission being accomplished.

At the same time, we must be careful that we do not undermine the ministerial calling of some in a well-intended (and biblically accurate) effort to affirm the value of every believer in God's kingdom. While there is a "universal calling" for all believers, there is also a "unique calling" for each individual disciple. When we consider the missional heart of our heavenly Father and the size of the task at hand, we can recognize the need for all believers, regardless of their vocational capacity, to leverage their unique calling for the cause of Christ.

The pathway forward: If we are going to commit ourselves to "calling out the called," we must also consider some practical ways we can do this in our ministries that are both biblically sound and personally responsible. It starts with a patient mindset and a humble faith that pursues more of a climate change in our ministries rather than creating lightning-strike moments. Calling should simply become a concept that is regularly talked about in our ministry in a variety of ways. Here are some examples.

- **1. Extend invitations** Perhaps the most obvious way that we can cultivate this type of "calling culture" is to regularly include a ministerial calling and its possibility as part of our invitations for response. If our listeners are not aware or do not know that it is an option to prayerfully consider, it is more difficult for them to discern this type of calling as part of God's will for their lives.
- **2. Share testimonies** Personal testimonies of those who have been called into vocational ministry can help our people disarm their fears and clarify their understanding to consider what full-time ministry service really involves. Our own experience of discerning and answering God's call can be used by the Lord to encourage our people to consider their calling.
- **3.** Celebrate the church Sometimes we can also be guilty of bemoaning our ministry responsibilities or complaining about relational dynamics in the church. Instead, we should model a love for the church as the body and bride of Christ that is positive, affirming and exhibits gratitude for the privilege of serving the Lord in a ministry capacity.
- **4. Provide opportunities** A primary element of discerning a call to ministry involves discovering your spiritual passions and gifts through service opportunities. We must encourage, enable and empower others to do the work of the ministry. As people begin to explore, exercise and employ their spiritual gifts, they may also begin to discern God's calling on their lives to serve in a similar vocational capacity.
- **5. Train leaders -** As we cultivate a ministry environment that cooperates with the Spirit in "calling out the called," we must be prepared to mentor and invest in those who discern a call to vocational ministry. Nothing will substitute for your personal involvement in their lives, and in many ways the discipleship process is identical to what we would do for every follower of Christ.

By integrating some of these principles and practices into our ministries we can help facilitate healthy conversations with our people that can lead to prayerful consideration about their potential ministerial calling.

NC Baptists, IMB Hold First-of-its-kind Sending Celebration

N.C. Baptists honored and prayed for missionaries with ties to churches from across the state as part of a first-of-its-kind Sending Celebration, held jointly between the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina and the International Mission Board (IMB) on Monday, Nov. 6. The celebration was the highlight of the opening session of the 2023 N.C. Baptist annual meeting, which drew more than 1,300 messengers and guests to the Joseph S. Koury Convention Center on the first day of the two-day event.



IMB President Paul Chitwood delivered the convention sermon in conjunction with the celebration, after which nearly 30 missionaries who have answered the call to go to the nations shared testimonies and prayer requests with those in attendance. Chitwood said the IMB had never held an event like this one before. "A service like this is literally something we've never done before at the International Mission Board in our 178-year history," said Chitwood, adding that Sending Celebrations typically include missionaries from multiple states. "Tonight is unique in that we are celebrating those N.C. Baptist IMB missionaries who have been sent out and are being sent out."

During his convention sermon, Chitwood praised N.C. Baptists for their collective efforts in calling, sending, supporting and praying for missionaries. The Baptist State Convention of North Carolina has led all state conventions in giving to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for international missions for 19 years. North Carolina also leads other state conventions in missionaries being sent to the field. "I'm so grateful to you N.C. Baptists for the way you are literally leading our broader Baptist family in engaging lostness around the world," Chitwood said.

In his message, Chitwood called lostness the world's greatest problem, saying it is an eternal problem, a universal problem and a growing problem. "Brothers and sisters, we know the solution to the world's greatest problem is the good news of the gospel of Jesus Christ," Chitwood said.

Prior to introducing missionaries from North Carolina who are currently serving on the field or preparing to go, Chitwood asked attendees if God might also be calling them. "My question tonight before we get to celebrating these who have already committed their lives is 'What about you?" Chitwood said. "Is God calling you?"

At the conclusion of Chitwood's message and the missionary introductions, N.C Baptist Executive Director-Treasurer Todd Unzicker posed a question to attendees. "Brothers and sisters, what do you think of your N.C. Baptist missionaries?" Unzicker asked. The question prompted a standing ovation and an extended time of applause from the audience as the missionaries stood and faced them on stage.

Unzicker closed the event by inviting N.C. Baptist leaders and attendees to pray for the missionaries and their prayer requests. Unzicker prayed that God would use the missionaries "to turn this world upside down for Jesus."


Pray for Physical Needs

We all know that Harvest Seeds Ministry is God's Ministry, and He has proven over and over again of how He takes care of His Ministry. The Pallet Loading, held on October 14, is just another example of how God was in charge of His Ministry. A group of 32 faithful servants met at 7:00am on October 14 to begin the work. It was raining. After about an hour delay, the team began the work. They had to put tarps down to put the pallets on because the asphalt was wet. The team had finished bringing everything out of the church, put on pallets, labeled, and shrink wrapped by 10:15. Turner Trucking had brought 2 of their 53-foot trailers, and after these were full, there were still 9 pallets left that Putnam Distributors would have to take to Turner's warehouse. There were a total of 61 pallets, 3706 boxes of Christian materials, 2 sewing machines, 4 large trunks and 5 large tubs of puppets, 33 sets of crutches, 61 walkers, 1 wheelchair, 111 walking canes, 1 'geri' chair, 1 rollator walker, and 1 transport chair. In addition to the above medical equipment, God blessed us since the last pallet loading to be able to give to local people with a need 3 wheelchairs, 1 knee scooter, and 1 walker.


