We've had two visits from our former troubled young Latino kids over the holidays. One family over Thanksgiving, and the other over Christmas break. We ministered to these kids starting 17 years ago. They now have beautiful families and are following after the Lord and live back in Miami, Florida. We still keep in contact with at least 12 of these former troubled teens, for over 17 years. We ministered to these Job Corps kids for 7 years and still now we are seeing His fruit from our labor. Some were once in gangs, involved in drugs, and running in the streets, and now most are doing well and serving our Lord with their families! Praise God!!! It was wonderful to have them in our home and be blessed to see what God is further doing in their lives.

Also my dear mother-in-law went home to be with the Lord Jesus five weeks ago. She had a beautiful homecoming, as she was surrounded by family, and she went home with hymns sung around her bed. It was a beautiful sight.

I am still ministering twice a week with our Spanish church, on Sunday and Tuesday evenings. I am also helping lead a men's Bible study in Cashiers, and am still keeping a presence with Bible study in the schools where I minister with a GREAT FCA team.

I'm excited for the new year, and I sense a need of urgency to keep sharing the good news of our Lord Jesus Christ more than ever. We see the day of His approaching growing closer and closer! Perhaps this may be the year of His return, and I just want to finish the race well, just as we often say.

We are eternally grateful for your encouragement, prayers, and support. In this season, it has been a huge blessing to us! Thank you!



This month we have spent time calling numerous ministry leaders and pastors throughout WV and east TN. Next month we will focus on calls to PA and New England pastors. We also have visited some ministries in NC and east TN this month and plan for many more visits into VA, KY, TN and NC during February. With each conversation, we get wonderful updates of what God is doing in communities throughout Appalachia. We also listen as some express frustration, loneliness, despair, and challenges. We strive to encourage each of these as we pray with them and speak of how volunteers can assist them in their work.

Next week I will be sending 2024 Christmas backpack applications to around 100 ministries. With the goal of 22,000 backpacks, NC Baptists are already looking forward to working with Appalachian Christmas Outreach again. We have just received participation forms from some new participants and the 2024 info has only been on the web site two days! We will train associational leaders soon to keep getting the word out to our churches across the state. What a blessing!

We also have numerous churches preparing to go on mission this year through the three partnerships with which we work. We have associations and churches entering long term partnerships as well. Our own local association is partnering with communities in the Northern Tier of PA. Pray that as we begin, the Kingdom will grow in that area of PA where gospel presence is sparse.

Thank you for your prayers for our family as well as ministry. Your partnership and prayer support mean more to us than you may ever know. We are reminded how important it is to hold up each other as we serve together. Prayer changes things. Almost daily we see how God is working to resolve some very difficult situations in people's lives. It should never surprise us but should just reinforce the power and majesty of our God. We are praising Him for each of you and pray for you to continue seeing Him work in your lives as you trust Him only.



NC Baptists Eclipse \$29M in CP Giving, Post Record Highs in Special Offerings

NC Baptist churches gave more than \$29 million to missions through the Cooperative Program (CP) and also contributed record -setting gifts to special missions offerings in 2023, according to financial data released Wednesday (Jan. 10) by the Baptist State Convention of North Carolina.

State convention officials reported nearly \$29.3 million in CP receipts in 2023 – the highest total since 2017 – and more than \$15 million in gifts to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering for international missions and more than \$7 million in gifts to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering for North American missions, both of which were record highs.

In addition, gifts to the North Carolina Missions Offering (NCMO) totaled more than \$2.3 million, which was also the highest total in convention history. The NCMO supports disaster response efforts, church planting and local missions across the state. For 2023, NCMO giving was up by about \$6,500 from 2022.

Cooperative Program giving by N.C. Baptists totaled \$29,288,078.46 in 2023, which was just short of last year's \$29.5 million budget by about \$212,000 or 0.72%. Despite finishing the year just under budget, the state convention finished 2023 in the black, and year-over-year CP giving was up by more than \$1.1 million or 4% from 2022.

The increased giving by N.C. Baptist churches comes at a time when nonprofit organizations have reported declines in charitable giving in recent years.

Gifts to the Annie Armstrong Easter Offering by N.C. Baptists totaled \$7,369,305.25 in 2023, which was up by more than \$633,000 or 9.4% from 2022. Gifts to the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering by N.C. Baptists totaled \$15,739,526.87 in 2023, which was up by nearly \$1.3 million or 8.9% from 2022. The record giving totals also marked the first time that N.C. Baptists have surpassed \$7 million in Annie Armstrong giving and \$15 million in Lottie Moon giving.

N.C. Baptists led all state conventions in giving to the Annie Armstrong and Lottie Moon offerings in 2023. N.C. Baptists have led in Lottie Moon giving for the past 19 years and have led in Annie Armstrong giving in all but two years during the same time period.

9 Things I've Learned About Bible Reading

For years, I've written a daily online devotion for folks who want to read the Word together. Over those years, I've learned some realities of Bible reading that I hope are helpful to you.

1. We in North America have incredible access to the Scriptures in our language. I've been all over the world where believers have none of the Bible in their language – and they sacrifice greatly to hear the Word taught anytime they have opportunity. Many of us, though, have more Bibles than human beings in our homes.

2. I need a reading plan. I wish I were disciplined enough to get up each morning, determine what I want to read, and let nothing get in the way of my reading. I can get sidetracked, though, so I need a plan.

3. I need to know the night before what I'm going to read the next day. This point, of course, ties to the previous one. Any time I spend in determining my reading each new day is an opportunity for something else to draw me away – so, I want my Bible open to my reading for the day when I wake up in the morning.

4. I enjoy some reading plans better than others. I prefer, for example, reading both Old Testament and New Testament materials each day rather than reading straight through the Bible. For me, the latter approach makes it seem like Thanksgiving before you get to the New Testament.

5. It's not imperative that I read through the entire Bible in one year. I do, but I don't feel obligated to do so. I do think we ought to read through the Scriptures at least every two years (a little less than two chapters a day), but it's most important to me that we spend some time with God each day.

6. Quantity of reading is not always best. I fear we've been taught that more reading is always better than less reading – that is, more chapters are always better than fewer chapters. This formula now reflects my thinking, however: Consistency (reading regularly) + quality (reading with some depth; not just skimming the text) + accountability (letting someone else know what I'm learning) > quantity of material.

7. Accountability matters. My writing daily online devotions began when I started holding myself accountable to a number of my own mentees. I needed them to know what I was reading, and I wanted to encourage them to read with me. All of us can send a quick email to others to let them know what the Lord's teaching us through His Word.

8. The Word is convictingly sweet. It really does penetrate deeply into the soul (Hebrews 4:12). It hurts and soothes at the same time – and I cannot imagine not reading it every day.

9. I want to give the next generation worn-out, well-marked, intentionally highlighted Bibles that reflect my love for God and His Word. Even if young people don't appreciate the gift until later in their lives, it seems to me that a used Bible's a good gift to give.




