## 10 WAYS TO BRIDGE GENERATION GAPS IN CHURCHES



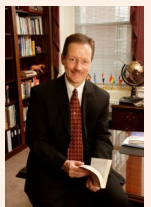
In many churches, generation gaps are still wide. I've learned, though, that generations often resist one another without knowing each other. It's easy to blame others when you don't know their names or their stories. Here are some practical ways to close those gaps by guiding the generations to get to know each other.

1. Intentionally invite older, long-term members to attend the church's membership class. The goal here, of course, is to introduce new members to older ones. Invite the older members to assist in the class by telling some of the church's history or leading a facility tour. Have a class dinner at one of the member's homes.
2. Include testimonies in the worship service. We often attend church with large numbers of people whose stories we don't know. Start to correct this problem by inviting selected members to share their testimony during the worship service – and be sure to vary the generations.
3. Start a cross-generational prayer ministry. Unite the student ministry or the young adult ministry with the senior adult ministry by connecting prayer partners from each generation. Informed praying would require that they get to know each other and their families well.
4. Create a “grandparenting” ministry. One of my former students pastored a church with several older folks whose children had moved away, in addition to a few young families who lived some distance from their parents and grandparents. He connected these groups and encouraged them to support one another in a new ministry.
5. Start a mentoring program. Jesus invested in others, and Paul did the same. Indeed, the Apostle expected older believers to teach and train younger believers (Titus 2). When we do what the Scriptures mandate, we can expect God to bless it.
6. Develop multi-generational small groups. I still affirm age-graded or life stage groups, but I also believe a church needs small groups that intentionally bring together the generations. These groups might be ongoing home-based groups, short-term study groups, or leadership groups (e.g., committees/ teams).
7. Do social ministry and servant evangelism. My guess is that younger folks will get on board quickly, as they want to do hands-on, relevant, transforming ministry. Older folks, too, recognize these responsibilities, and they appreciate the zeal that young leaders add to the work.
8. Enlist a young leader to oversee the senior adult ministry. Most often, churches enlist older believers to lead the senior adult ministry. I encourage you, though, to seek a young minister who can lead and learn from the older believers. When the generations learn from each other, the church will be stronger.
9. Plan intentional studies addressing the generations. Information and education are strong tools in bridging these gaps. Many times, our assumptions and conclusions about others are just wrong.
10. Set up a family mission trip each year. Then, encourage multiple generations of families in your church to participate in the trip.

## Five Ways to Keep Your Building Secure

Every organization would like to believe its facility is safe from crime, but plenty of details can get overlooked when you are developing a security plan for your building. Of course, there are many elements to crime prevention, but we have developed a list of steps you should take to keep your building secure.

1. **Conduct background checks and more.** Every employee should undergo a criminal background check before starting with your organization. But background checks alone aren't necessarily enough to identify people who may be a security risk. You should also take special care with:
  - **Applications** – Consider asking open-ended questions to get an idea of the person's character.
  - **References** – Ask each candidate to provide two or three references. Before calling the references, prepare a list of questions that asks about the person's defining characteristics.
  - **Interview** – An interview is the best way to get to know a candidate and why they want to be involved with your organization.
2. **Light up your outside.** Darkness breeds criminal activity, so make sure your parking lot, sidewalks, and doors are well-lit. Establish a schedule for checking bulbs; if a criminal notices a burnt-out light, they could view that as an invitation to invade your property.
3. **Be aware of potential threats.** Building security isn't just about keeping doors and windows locked and entryways lit—it also involves keeping your eyes and ears open for anyone who might cause harm. Regularly view and review social media relating to your organization. Keep informed about issues both inside and outside the organization that may lead to threats, such as disgruntled employees, community unrest, or domestic issues.
4. **Partner with your local law enforcement agencies.** Ask them to participate in security and violence prevention planning with your organization. Provide these agencies with maps of your facility and ask them to include your building in their regular patrols.
5. **Limit visitor access to your building.** If you are a school, all doors should be locked during the day and visitors should be required to sign in to gain access to the building. Other facilities may not need to be quite so strict about allowing visitors into the building, but it should never be easy for someone to slip unnoticed into your facility. For a house of worship, where a visitor may wish to pray on their own, there should be a sign-in procedure so you have a record of anyone who was in the building.

You can never fully anticipate what kinds of security challenges you may encounter, but you can at least take these basic steps to keep your people and building safe. 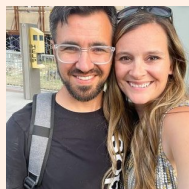

## HOW NC BAPTISTS ARE 'PRAYING FOR THE NATIONS' IN 2024

N.C. Baptists are on mission together to reach the nations with the gospel.

Throughout 2023, N.C. Baptists showed this “on mission together” spirit by completing “Praying for the Nations,” a prayer guide focused on North Carolina unreached people groups, N.C. Baptist missionaries and church planters. In total, more than 1,000 N.C. Baptists prayed for 30 unreached people groups, as well as 250 missionaries and church planters sent from North Carolina churches.

In 2024, N.C. Baptists will have the opportunity to continue “praying for the nations” through the 2024 Praying for the Nations prayer guide. This prayer guide will focus on unreached people groups living in North Carolina. Starting in January, NC Baptists will begin to pray for two people groups each month, praying over a total of 24 unreached people groups throughout 2024.

Praying for these “24 in ‘24” will not only provide NC Baptists an opportunity to pray for the lost, but it will also give churches the chance to learn about unreached people groups living in their local communities. “Prayer is our primary strategy,” said Todd Unzicker, executive director-treasurer for N.C. Baptists. “And we believe the local church is God’s ‘plan A’ for taking the gospel to the unreached.”

NC Baptists can sign up now to receive monthly resources and prayer points related to each people group. In addition, the full prayer guide is available for download now. Both in the prayer guide and in the monthly newsletter, NC Baptists will find a brief description of each people group — including their background, their population and location in North Carolina, and ways N.C. Baptists can be praying for them. Consider joining NC Baptists by praying for 24 people groups in 2024.



## HELP PROVIDE THREE MEALS EVERY DAY

### Because too many have gone without.

When children come into Baptist Children's Homes' (BCH) care, it is obvious they have gone without: **without food, without love, without hope.** One of the first ways our children learn that they are loved is when their cottage parents serve them the regular meals they were unable to count on before arriving. This is because their families let them down. When a child can't depend on loved ones to meet his or her basic needs, trusting any adult becomes almost impossible.

### How does the Food Roundup help?

When your church, along with NC Baptists across the state, collect food, supplies and gift cards through the Food Roundup, you ensure that we can provide three meals a day plus snacks to our boys and girls and everyone we serve.
